

Fatality Risk by Accident Category from 2018-2022 HY










The big picture at TAP

- COVID years with significant reduction in numbers but peaked ratios
- Positive trend since mid 2022
- Overall supervision with local actions
- SOPs defined and additional actions/awareness for specific locations











Case study - OXB




The scenario

- Osvaldo Vieira International Airport (IATA: OXB, ICAO: GGOV), is the international airport that serves the city of Bissau, the capital of Guinea-Bissau
- Bird hazards are a known threat at OXB, with information available for flight crews

LOSS OF CONTROL/BIRD HAZARD


 Intense bird activity in the vicinity of the aerodrome, day and night and up to 2000 ft. At night birds or other animals tend to lay down on the RWY. Confirm with Bissau Control that an inspection was made to the RWY to clear birds or other animals/obstructions.







Our numbers...





Key Safety concerns

- Higher bird activity during night, specially at low altitude during approach and take-off segments and on the runway. During daytime there are reports of reduced bird activity on the runway and/or take-off and landing path.
- Identified some conditions that could lead to wildlife presence:
 - Untreated grass in the airport
 - Slaughterhouses near the airport

Mitigation strategies

Internally

 Based on statistics and local reports, the bird activity on the runway is higher during night-time. Flight schedules to/from OXB were changed to daytime.


And externally...

- Requested Airport action plan to reduce bird activity.
- Guinean Authorities were Diplomatically urged to close slaughterhouses which were attracting avian life to the airport vicinity.



Follow-up

- No events over 2022
- Two new events in 2023, causes reassessed with Airport Authorities for further mitigation actions
